

2016 NCAA Men's Football Rules Survey: Executive Summary

PURPOSE

Per the request of the NCAA Men's Football Rules Committee, a survey was developed to obtain feedback from head men's football coaches from all NCAA member institutions, as well as conference commissioners, officials and coordinators of officials, in regards possible rule changes. The results from this survey seek to provide the committee with detailed information on the respondents' opinions regarding current and potential women's basketball rules.
